

"Video Lesson: Games" Lesson 7: Games Vintage Classroom

As we have seen, people in 1895 worked hard. Children were expected to help with household chores and sometimes work outside of the home as well. Schools reinforced the values of duty before pleasure, hard work, and taught students the skills they would need to manage their own households, work in local industry, or manage their own businesses.

But life was not all work. People gathered for picnics, to help each other with large projects like building barns or finishing a new quilt, and they found time to relax and play games together. Children's games were often based on things that could be found around the house or yard. Old wagon wheels, hoops to hold together barrels, sticks, and balls could be adapted to other uses for fun. Carving or whittling sticks into hand-held games, dolls, or figurines would have provided enjoyment and a fun treasure.
